#### **Session Summary**

5. Jeremiah 29: 4-7 shows God calling the Israelites to be a blessing to the Babylonians, their enemies, whom God allowed to conquer Israel and lead them into exile. What would it look like for us to be a blessing to our enemies as an intercultural Gospel community?
